- We will walk slowly both times; the goal is to be accessible and enjoy the scenery around us.

CONVERSATION WITH INTERNATIONAL PEACEMAKER: Peter Egwudah

NOTES FROM PASTOR DAVID "Perfect Pickles!"

Dear Friends in Christ,

In early August, Carole and I traveled up to Lancaster County to drive serene, country roads, watch a musical, shop, and eat some great Amish food. It was a quick, but thoroughly enjoyable two days. As we walked through the shops of the 70year-old Kitchen Kettle Village, Carole went on to the country store while I ducted into the Jam & Relish Kitchen to see what they were cooking and taste a few samples, always a welcome treat. Of course, the relish, salsa, jams, and pickles were piled high for the crowds on this summer's day. As I looked over the sweet chunk pickles, I found several varieties, including the "pickle of the day," those labeled "Perfect Pickle Chips." I asked the host standing there amid the waiting jars, what makes these pickles perfect and how they differ from the adjacent sweet pickles, which I had purchased before. She told me that they are sweet, but with a twist, with a perfectly balanced hint of dill and garlic, perfect as an accompaniment to sandwiches. She used the word "perfect" several times! Of course, I couldn't resist first sampling and then purchasing a jar. They are tasty and downhome good.

It's certainly challenging to find a perfect recipe, a perfect balance of ingredients, and a perfect satisfaction when cooking and baking. Often, it's about trial and error, samples, and test tastes. In life, you and I know that days and seasons are not perfect, for us as individuals or within communities. We struggle on our journeys, to seek, to remain faithful, to aspire, to serve, to love. Though we are not perfect, while life is not perfect, the scriptures instead describe us as "cracked pots," as those who have value and something to give and share as we point to our living God, despite our falling far short of perfection.

"Remember, our Message is not about ourselves; we're proclaiming Jesus Christ, the Master. All we are is messengers, errand runners from Jesus for you. It started when God said, 'Light up the darkness!' and our lives filled up with light as we saw and understood God in the face of Christ, all bright and beautiful. If you only look at us, you might well miss the brightness. We carry this precious Message around in the unadorned clay jars of our ordinary lives. That's to prevent anyone from confusing God's incomparable power with us." (2 Corinthians 4:5-7, *The Message*) As those who are less than perfect, you and I can find strength, affirmation, and encouragement in these words of the apostle Paul.

We have just completed our summer worship series, "I Want to Know You... Faith Practices That Are Fruitful." As we have explored together, we have experienced a thoughtful and uplifting weekly experience of God's goodness and grace shaping our daily walk with the Lord. And while you and I know we are not perfect, our faith practices have reminded us that God is working within our cracked nature to bless and send us forth, refreshed and renewed as disciples. We begin the fall together (back to 8:30 AM and 11:00 AM worship!) as a community of faith, committed to finding the recipe, the balance of ingredients, and maybe even the satisfaction that will help us accomplish the chief end of humanity, "to glorify God and enjoy God forever."

PASTOR JULIA'S MUSINGS

Friends in Christ,

I don't know about any of you, but about once every two years, a weird thing happens: All a sudden, I become obsessed with sports. And I don't mean football or baseball, I mean gymnastics, white water kayaking, speedwalking, horse jumping, women's rugby, and any other obscure sport that is not normally on TV, but is SO fun to watch.

If it hasn't become clear—I LOVE the Olympics. Like deeply love the Olympics.

As I had it on as much as I possibly could this past month, I became more and more aware how amazing of a representation of God's kingdom the Olympics are. And I don't mean in athletic prowess; I for sure hope that God's kingdom welcomes people who are a tad less athletically gifted. I saw God's kingdom in the people from all the world coming together, in the comradery and community, in the diversity of cultures, and people coming together from all different perspectives.

I see God's kingdom in people from North and South Korea taking a selfie together, in the Turkish sharpshooter winning silver with no frills, in athletes encouraging each other and lifting each other up. I see God's kingdom in the variety of food in the Olympic village that cater to everyone, in the underdog coming out on top, in the laughter of diver Tom Daley as he knits a "Paris 24" sweater on the sidelines with his family, in the joy of simply being together.

I see God's kingdom in strangers coming together and becoming friends.

I wonder what would happen if that same comradery to stranger around the world transcended just the Olympics every two years. I wonder what would happen if we remember that we are all part of God's kingdom and not all that different from one another.

There is a lot to learn from coming together. And I think we ought to do more of it!



It's applesauce season. Living in the Shenandoah Valley during applesauce season is such a delight. Right now, we are cooking Ginger Golds. Soon it will be Fujis. The smells, feeling and memories apple sauce season brings are just a pleasure.

I grew up in New York state. We lived near Courtland, home of the Courtland apple, but our family also had Macintosh and Granny Smith apples in good numbers. The men picked the apples. The women "did" them.

My grandmother, Great Aunt Dena, and I spent hours on the back porch of Grandma's family home peeling apples. The back porch time began when the peas came in and continued through green beans, berries of all sorts, and, finally, apples. The last effort was end-of-the-year spaghetti sauce, when we picked everything just before the first killing frost and made sauce.

We would sit on the porch facing the Susquehanna River with our produce, our favorite knives, and baskets or bowls. We talked and talked, listened to stories from each generation, and managed to solve every conceivable world problem. My grandfather used to say that earth would be a better place if more people snapped beans on the porch. I am convinced he was correct.

At first, we would compete to see who could peel the longest peel without breaking it. Later, we cut the apples into quarters. The first method was more fun, but the second was more efficient. Aunt Dena had been a one-room schoolhouse teacher. She told stories of riding the train to the schoolhouse and walking through snow up to her knees to get there first and start the fire. Grandma said that snow got deeper and deeper every time Aunt Dena told the story. Aunt Dena's reply was always a "harrumph."

Grandma told stories about family members. Great Uncle Lester, who was a Baptist minister and drove like the Lord was in the side seat; Great Uncle George, who died from an appendix surgery performed on his own kitchen table; and Great Grandfather Thomas, who (according to family tradition) designed the "Don't Tread on Me" flag during the revolution. I knew Uncle Lester and Aunt Margaret. Mom would not let me ride with Uncle Lester... ever!

I talked about what I was reading and how frustrating my brother could be. As I grew, I asked questions about dating, becoming a woman, all those secret things one assumes one's mother could never understand.

Today, I make applesauce with two

friends. We work in an air-conditioned kitchen, but the rest of the process is generations old. We all consider ourselves blessed to have found friends who know the true secrets of applesauce. Don't miss any seeds, stir often to avoid scorching, add nothing but apples to the pot, and share. Share stories... share our lives... share our laughter. Talk about

When we are ready to portion the applesauce, we all thank God for freezers and electricity. Modern times no longer require the heat of the canning process. Our applesauce is perfect every year. Our stories get even better.

ART (OPC's Architectural Review Team) will form six focus groups to assist in the process: Staff, Building & Grounds, Technology, Fellowship Hall, Kitchen, and Music. Mitch Orndorff will head the Capital Campaign to support this project. ART and the Vision Team have introduced the FAQ document at August 18, 2024 worship, which will be updated regularly and posted at the website for easy reference.

- Mission Team shared that the elimination of the Valley Assistance Network has had a negative impact on our needlest communities. Family Promise is trying to fill needs where they are able. Mission has many presentations coming (check upcoming fall 2024 events below).
- Evangelism Team has created an Opequon Presbyterian Church T-shirt for purchase. Look for details coming soon.
- Evangelism and Fellowship Teams are collaborating to provide a new directory for Opequon Presbyterian Church. Watch for opportunities to update your photos!
- Building & Grounds Team has been taking on lots of emergencies and improvements to the grounds: determining the cause of flooding during storm Debby, discovering wiring right under the concrete at the front porch entrance, replacing the concrete walks and entrances to the front of the church with no steps up or down, and providing space in the Sanctuary for the Audio Visual operation. A motion was approved to cover the cost of sealing the new concrete so that salt will not deteriorate the new concrete.
- The Technology Team's Wi-Fi upgrade is being installed.
- Session moved and voted in favor of replacing the copier with a newer machine under our existing contract. Session approved the June and July 2024 Financial Reports.
- Session approved the recommendation from Personnel Team to adopt the Covenant Package for Employees that Work 20-30 or more hours per week (a revised PC USA benefit offering).
- Session approved the recommendation from Worship Team for communion to be served during the upcoming Worship on Wednesday service November 6, 2024.
- Christian Education Ministry continue to expand learning opportunities. Session approved a new Young Adult Class Study from Fresh Outlook Bible Studies and Youth Fundraising ideas that include a Wall of Envelopes, car vacuuming and notecards that feature the beautiful sunsets seen at Opequon Presbyterian Church.
- Deacons and Congregational Care Ministry will need volunteers to assist with Nathan Windle's transportation trips to dialysis in September. To sign up, contact Winter Brooks at winterbrooks@comcast.net or the church office.


Laurie Carver

 - A: My kids were competitive swimmers and I officiated at High School Swim Meets.






SUNDAY MORNING ADULT FAITH FORMATION RESUMES...

"OUT OF THE DARKNESS" COMMUNITY WALK



The 10th annual Out of the Darkness Community Walk for Suicide Prevention will be held on Saturday, October 12 in Stephen's City. OPC is sponsoring a team again to walk and raise money for suicide awareness, education, and prevention.

September is Suicide Prevention Month, so this is a great time to start thinking about being part of OPC's team. Through education and awareness, we can recognize risk factors and prevent many suicides from occurring. The OPC Mission Team has committed \$500 toward the event. Our goal is to match, and hopefully surpass, that amount with donations for our team. Last year, Team Opequon was 3rd out of 58 teams in total donations with nearly \$2,000 raised!

The walk, which begins at 10:00 AM, winds through Sherando Park, beginning and ending at the Sherando High School Stadium with a program commemorating those lost to suicide. There is also a handicap accessible option. Suicide takes many lives each year and is the 11th leading cause of death in the US with nearly 50,000 deaths by suicide, in addition to 1.6 million suicide attempts. It is the second leading cause of deaths in Virginia in both the 10-24 and the 25-34 age groups.


