ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION CELEBRATING OUR MINISTRY

The Session of Opequon Presbyterian Church calls for the Annual Meeting of the Congregation and Celebration of Ministry for Sunday, March 1, at 10:00 AM in the Sanctuary.

The purpose of the meeting is to review the written report to the congregation (available beginning Sunday, February 22), which will include statistical and financial reports, ministry team reports, staff reports, and the 2026 church calendar. We will also hear reports from the church's Architectural Review and Capital Campaign Teams. The congregation will be asked to elect four representatives to the church's Nominating Committee. In addition, the annual meeting of the corporation—Opequon Presbyterian Church, Inc.—will occur, with a report by the trustees on investments in 2025 and the corporation's and trustees' organization in the current year.

The meeting will be called to order promptly at 10:00 AM and will be preceded by a church coffee in the Gathering Area from 9:30 to 9:55 AM. Based on the positive feedback on the format from last year, we look forward to worship, fellowship and meeting **OR** fellowship, meeting, and worship, depending on whether you attend the 8:30 or 11:00 AM service that day. All active members of Opequon are encouraged to participate in this meeting, exercising both the privilege and responsibility of church membership, as we give thanks for our ministry and mission as the called people of God.



NOTES FROM PASTOR DAVID

"On the Road with Jesus"

Dear Friends in Christ,

The last time I wrote for our monthly newsletter, I was looking ahead into this new year at least two weeks before Christmas and our special celebrations. Now as I write this, the Christmas tree and decorations came down about ten days ago and we are fully into 2026. We're on the move! The daily rhythm of life has not slowed down and neither has the calendar of events at Opequon Church. Though it seems like we just went through a major seasonal change, our church leadership has been busily preparing for Lent, which begins earlier this year than last (February 18 rather than March 5) but not as early as it possibly could (February 4, though rarely; February 10 in 2027). So, we are quickly moving toward Ash Wednesday. And during Lent, we'll be "On the Road with Jesus," our Lenten theme.

The scriptures of the season, from wilderness to well, from parade to upper room, from cross to garden tomb, will explore encounters with Jesus by people who were present on the road then and who are walking with Jesus today. In addition to weekly worship, our devotional, "The Road to the Cross," and our Lenten study, "Meeting Jesus on the Road," will guide us as we walk together. While we won't be "On the Road Again," like Willie Nelson's rendition of a musical tour, we will be spending time focusing on how Jesus dealt with real situations, sharing light, love, and life, teaching and empowering us to do the same. And as our Lenten study authors emphasize, "we will learn that faith is not sedentary but a relationship with God that grows and changes over a lifetime."

We're on the move, and we're on the road with Jesus. Won't you join us?

PASTOR TRACIE'S JUST THINKIN'...

February always takes me to the sugarbush. When I was a child, I used to go with my Uncle Alvin to tap maple trees. When I was very young, we went by horse and wagon.



Imagine getting up early and dressing in many layers so you could get in an open wagon and

head into the forest. The days were still cold by Southern standards, but the sun was warm on my mittens as I held the reigns so Uncle Alvin could tap the maple trees. He used a hand drill, inserted a tin tap and put a bucket on the tap's hook. Often the sap would begin to drip immediately. Later he would repeat the trip to empty the buckets. It was important to gather often as the trees ran fast at the beginning of the season and every drop of sap mattered. Years later, the sap was gathered by plastic tubes that ran into a large, square closed container. This was more practical, but less fun, in my opinion.

Uncle Alvin had a huge vat in the barn area where he boiled the syrup over a wood fire. The ratio was 40:1—forty gallons of sap for one gallon of syrup. What still surprises me is that the trees are not harmed by sap harvesting. This is because care is taken not to drill too deep and only mature trees are tapped.

Later in life, the first congregation I served as a Lay Pastor was in the center of commercial maple country. You cannot even imagine the colors of autumn there. During sugar season, the entire congregation of up to 50 people went to a sugarbush for pancakes in February. We occupied almost the entire dining room. The folk watched their watches during worship and their faces let me know if the service was running long. Once the benediction was done, they rushed to their cars to get the best seats in the house. After all, it could take up to 17 minutes to get served if one was not among the first people seated. The syrup was always hot. It came directly from the vat.



I love the fact that gathering sap and making syrup is still mostly done in the old ways. Traditions like that work to connect older folk like me with younger friends who might have similar experiences. As a child, I took the gift of maple trees and all they brought for granted. As an older adult, I know just how much work goes into maintaining them as a source of sweetness. As a child, I thought of maple syrup as a fun part of life, something Uncle Alvin and I could proudly do together and be in charge of. As an adult, I realize that the entire maple experience is a gift, and I know that I am not at all in charge.

We praise Your holy name and thank You for loving all of us unconditionally, with all of our flaws and our sinful nature.





FEBRUARY COLLECTION FOR CCAP



GENEROSITY / STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

(From Pastor Tracie Martin & the Generosity Team)

February is the time when I look deeply at where we went in 2025 and where we could go in 2026. February is the time when the generosity of this congregation becomes especially apparent. Why? Because, in the life of our church, February is the "almost, but not yet" month. Christmas is over. Lent will not start until the middle of the month. February gives us two weeks to plot, think, remember, and plan.

Culturally, February is the month of love. Valentine's Day reminds us that we show love by caring, supporting, and occasionally gifting. Using this standard, 2025 Was absolutely a year of OPC love.

I wish I could tell you how many meals were delivered to people in 2025. I know that the Tuesday Morning Mission group delivers about 20 meals every month, except July and August. Let's call that 180 meals. Then, there are the meals delivered following LOGOS. Don't forget the meals that follow each special event at the church, and the meals covered by the Congregational Care Team. Yeah... I ran out of fingers, too.

How many people received needed rides to medical appointments, some of them life-saving? How many rides to choir, worship, special events, Feast Groups? How many gift bags were delivered to homebound people last year? How many cookies were left on the office counter, just in case someone was hungry? How many chocolates?

Our congregation's Stewardship generosity covers the bills for operating our church. It covers our mission outreach. It takes care of our building. Our congregation's discreet acts of generosity provide an additional layer of valuable support and assistance. Much of this is easily missed as daily chores occupy our minds. I'll even bet that some of us just take it all for granted... until it hits us personally, that is.

When Bill and I first moved to this area, we got the flu. It was horrid. The flu... just at Christmas. We didn't know many people in the congregation. We were newbies and had not found our places yet. Still, the Tuesday Morning Mission group at that time gave us lunch. It looks like a small thing until it happened to you. That gift truly helped us feel at home at OPC. I wonder how many other visitors and seekers have had a similar experience. For us, that defined a generous congregation, and we wanted to become part of it. Becoming part of Christ's heart, hands, and feet made us smile.


