# NOTES FROM THE PASTOR: "Platooning"

Dear Friends in Christ,

When Carole and I began our vacation in July, our first evening stop was Cooperstown, New York. I don't know if you have been to Cooperstown, but it is a picturesque village at the foot of pristine Otsego Lake, 60 miles west of Albany, 67 miles southeast of Syracuse, and 145 miles northwest of New York City. Of course, Cooperstown is most known as the home of the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum; hence, the reason for our visit. I highly recommend the Hall of Fame, a treasure trove for all baseball fans, an incredible collection of all things, baseball. But all things baseball does not end at the museum: it extends to the entire town, because everything throughout

the town is about baseball, so much so that Carole, who was so gracious about this first excursion, had enough of baseball by evening. When we went to the Fly Creek Cider Mill & Orchard the following morning (we both highly recommend this stop!), we laughed at the sign at our parking space. (seen here  $\rightarrow$ )



While moving in and out of the stores with all the baseball paraphernalia, I picked up a new book: After the Miracle: The Lasting Brotherhood of the '69 Mets, written by Art Shamsky, a '69 Met himself. I've been a Mets fan as long as I can remember, since we were both born in the same year, 1962—the Mets in April, me in September. Of course, I knew about the "1969 Miracle Mets," the first expansion team to win the World Series. beating the mighty, heavily-favored Baltimore Orioles 4 games to 1. Since I was only 7 then, I remember the older kids listening on a transistor radio (I'm really dating myself!) to some of the games on the bus ride home from school. Exciting doesn't come close to describing how the Mets whipped up a frenzy across the country that year, overcoming their loveable loser image and providing more than just a miracle in baseball, but symbolizing hope for the underdog and for a wartorn, conflicted, beat-up nation, following up on the lunar landing back in July. What I discovered in the book about that team was that the key to their success was the absolute reliance of their manager, Gil Hodges, on teamwork, on platooning players in positions. In baseball, a platoon is a method of sharing playing time, where two players are selected to play a single defensive position. Usually, one platoon player is right-handed, and the other is left-handed, batting on days against

their opposite handed pitching counterparts. The Mets had star pitchers, but no incredibly stellar hitters, so platooning, teamwork, building and working off their strengths was the key to their success.

At Opequon Church, teamwork is not only preferred; it is necessary, essential, and required. We need each person's gifts, each person's time and talents, each person's commitment to share and offer for the common good. We are not a church of lone rangers, "baseball stars." We are a church, a team, of can-do, work together, love and serve Jesus disciples, who can make a difference together. We often platoon to get the job done, to help one another, to encourage and challenge each other as we walk together and with Jesus. This month, we'll think about that more deeply in worship, education, fellowship, and service. We'll celebrate "Back to Church Sunday" on September 21 with the theme, "Life Is Better... Together." And this fall, I hope you will consider how you will build and work off your strengths, joining the team, for a great season ahead.

# PASTOR TRACIE'S JUST THINKIN'... About Stewardship!

Every year I look forward to September. It has become my favorite month. Why? Because I can enjoy our porch every day. The high heat is over, the grackles have moved on so I can watch the birds at the feeder, days are still not too short, and things have not completely ramped up at the church. It's a sweet break before Stewardship and the holidays become all too real.

I do most of my Christmas shopping in September. I also make sure to finish our annual Generosity Campaign.

By now, most of you know that writing and promoting our annual stewardship outreach is a true passion for me. I know most pastors find this odd, but for me, this important outreach is a strong center of faith.

For me, stewardship is a way of life that includes, but is not at all limited to, writing a check. It is a means of working toward a just world by using the things of life responsibly and mindfully. It is a way to show God that we appreciate the many gifts of life; a way to help and consider people we care about in our own way. Our generosity is self-expression that is not self-centered.

My hobby of gluten-free cooking is part of my stewardship at OPC. The idea that a person could feel left out or could self-exclude from fellowship activities because of dietary limitations feels wrong to me. Being dairy-free falls into the same place. Several churches where I raised this concern decided not to bother modifying their menus. OPC welcomed gluten-free cooking. This is only one reason I decided to spend my time here.

Laughing is another aspect of generosity or stewardship for many of us. After years and years of formal, stilted letters asking for money, I find that cheerful giving is much better. Who ever said, "I give to the church because it's boring." When we can smile and laugh as we support our congregation, fun and generosity become essential. I think Jesus knew this and it made him more accessible to everyday people. I know most of us actively look forward to Sunday worship as well as events in between. We never know just what will happen, but we know we will be having a good time with old and new friends. Why do you think we all watch the "Time for All Ages" so closely. We can never be sure just what will come up. Pastor David isn't always sure either, which is even greater fun.

Singing in the Choir, offering special music, serving on Session, the Deacons, or a team are all aspects of stewardship. "Redding up the pews," volunteering for Logos, teaching or attending Faith Formation, participating in Senior Outreach, stopping to salt an icy walk, picking up a stray bottle or paper, planting, watering... it all counts. It all demonstrates generosity of spirit. How often do you give yourself credit for generosity of spirit? You should, because everything we do for the good of the church and God's people demonstrates **who** and **whose** we are.

Last, but hardly least, prayer is an especially essential aspect of generous stewardship as well as effective evangelism. Years ago, I served a congregation that was not invested in personal prayer. They prayed, of course, but active prayer seemed less important to them than to me. Then I met a woman of the church who made a list of everyone she believed needed her prayer and prayed over it several times a day. I mentioned her practice in a sermon without giving her name. People remarked that I did not need to give a name, because everyone knew how she prayed. I asked them if that was important. "Of course," they said. Then I asked them what it could mean to a community if there were to be a church that would pray for anyone who needed or asked for it. I told them that we could be known as the church that would pray for anyone. Before long, that congregation began talking more openly about prayer. They asked friends and neighbors about

their prayer needs. The phone at the church office started ringing with prayer requests. I was excited when I made a hospital visit and a nurse asked me if I belonged to "that church that would pray for anybody." Years later, that church is still known for its praying. It makes a difference.

How is this stewardship? The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines stewardship as "the conducting, supervising, or managing of something *especially* the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care." Prayer fits that definition well. It recognizes needs, addresses them, entrusts them to a higher power for additional care, and demonstrates the importance of the subject and/or person prayed about.

Our church needs our treasures to continue to do God's business—obviously! No one wants to broil in summer worship or freeze in the winter. Our time and talents are equally needed. We need to define "time and talent" carefully. There are fewer limits than one might imagine. Our lives of faith must be lives of generous stewardship in many, many ways. Here at Opequon Pres, as far as I can see, they truly are.

Suicide takes many lives each year and was the 11th leading cause of death in the US in 2021, with an average of 132 per day, as well as 1.7 million reported suicide attempts. It is the second leading cause of deaths in Virginia for both the 10-24 and the 25-35 age groups.

The route is a pleasant, 1.2 mile walk through Sherando Park. It will begin and end at the Sherando High School Stadium, with a handicap accessible option. The Mission Team has committed \$500 toward the event, and we hope to match that with donations for our team. (see flyers in Gathering Area for more info)

Dear OPiE,

Are three new sets of interior stairs part of our new building? I saw a design schematic and it seemed to indicate three sets of steps from downstairs to up.

Dear Curious,

I just looked at the schematics and I was not sure about the stairs, so I asked Pastor David.

He told me that two currently existing staircases will be changed. The staircases are now outside, leading into the building. They are hard to keep up. They collect water when it rains and ice in the winter. We cannot eliminate these exits because of county law, but we can move them inside and eliminate the mess. The third staircase you saw was probably the one for the playground when we earlier expected to build it outside the nursery. Now the playground will be moved to a better and less expensive location.

It makes sense to keep as many staircases inside as possible to me because of snakes. Inside stairs are less available to black snakes and I am quite afraid of blacksnakes. When I was out in the field, before returning to OPC, those black snakes tried to eat me. I survived by hiding and making false mice out of mud and leaves. I know they are still unhappy with me, so I do not want them anywhere near the new Fellowship Hall. I don't want to be afraid when I clean up the crumbs left from events.

#### Dear OPiE.

You are very observant to notice the new stairwells. As part of the addition project, we intend to replace two outside sets of steps with two enclosed, interior stairwells. Both of these emergency exit stairs are required by the Virginia Building Code. They are a crucial part of a building's safety system, providing an unobstructed path for everyone to exit during emergencies like fires. We will not be building three sets of interior stairwells. Since our property is not nice and flat, we will have a few locations where outside steps are needed to help you get to the ground, as from the new kitchen to the dumpsters. This was a great question, and thanks for asking.


