NOTES FROM PASTOR DAVID "The Bush in the Front Yard: A Story A Lesson"

Dear Friends in Christ,

Over the past several months, Carole and I have worked on our yard, removing eight bushes, boxwoods, that have slowly been declining. We dug each one up individually and piled them behind our storage building until we could cart them away to the landfill. Of course, it was hard work as we hand dug around each bush and pried ground, mind you, but we persevered. Then, in late August, we had one more bush to go—the largest one in the front yard. It had rained several inches that week, so we thought that it would be easier with wetter ground. Little did we know! The bush was larger. The roots were deeper and wider. And that wet ground, that red clay soil: it held onto the root system like concrete! We chopped and chopped. We dug and dug. We pushed and pulled. We had Knox on that Friday and he watched with both wonder and a puzzled look on his face. I wanted to get that bush out before Joel got there with the pick-up truck to help me load up all the debris from the eight bushes. And our neighbor did come over to help me drag the bush out of the hole, just as Joel arrived. So, then the three of us loaded up the truck for the first of two trips Joel and I made to the landfill that day.

That's the story. Now the lesson...

Those bushes had incredible root systems. I can't believe how strong they were, how resilient they were. They kept those bushes in place, enduring all kinds of weather conditions. I don't know when those bushes were planted, but they were there when we moved in twenty-seven years ago. As I think now about those roots, I am reminded of this congregation through its 292 years—what an incredible history of perseverance; what an amazing inheritance that has been passed on from one generation to another. And while there have certainly been stages of challenge and even decline—through war, fire, and conflict—the church now is strong and thriving because the roots are strong, the connections are deep and wide. I also learned on that Friday that we should have waited—I should have waited—waited for help, waited for Joel to arrive. I should not have thought that we could do that all by ourselves. But how often do we think that? I can do it all by myself. But we can't. We need each other. We need to work as a team. We need to help one another. That's always an essential discovery for us within the church. Our teamwork is crucial to the vitality, spirit, and discipleship of our

congregation. As we begin new ventures in our life together, just imagine how much we can do as we work together. We readily say we are the hands, heart, and feet of Christ (and Tracie says, the smile too!). In this season of stewardship, I think our legacy and our teamwork will flourish as a church.

PASTOR TRACIE'S JUST THINKIN'

When Bill and I moved to Yellow Spring, we noticed a pond with three ducks. We pass by that pond every time we drive to Winchester. The pond was often occupied by three ducks, a male and two females. We could tell the gender by their stances.

It became a game for us to find the "duckies" as we drove by. Sometimes they were in the field, sometimes alarmingly near the road, most often in the water. We never gave them names, we just watched for them and laughed at ourselves for being so happy when we found them.



This spring, one of the females disappeared. We thought she might just have stayed home that day, but the ensuing weeks demonstrated that she was, in fact, gone. The male and the other female were still visible, but we

wondered just what had happened to the third. Then, just a few weeks ago, the male was alone. He is still there, alone in the pond or in the field. We keep wondering just what happened.

There are predators in West Virginia, lots of predators—foxes, coyotes, bears, oh my! The road is also very busy with speeding pickups and 18 wheelers. We discovered the ducks 8 years ago, so they could have hit the end of their expected life span. We don't know the farmer/landholder who lives near the pond, so we will never know what truly happened.

Neither the landholder nor the ducks will ever know that they have had a place in our lives, but we truly do miss the girls and worry about the guy.

I wonder how often this happens at OPC? Not that we have a lot of ducks in the congregation, but the church has grown to the point that it is hard, even as a pastor, to get to know everyone well. There are faces we might see regularly without knowing names. There are names that might come up regularly but fail to draw faces. There are just a lot of us in our church family.

Still, every one of us matters to God, even if only Pastor David knows all our names. Each of us is part of Christ's heart, hands, and feet; we each have a place. When one of us is missing, ill, or in trouble, it matters! When one of us is sad or troubled, the entire church family changes and often, it is unexpected people who respond.

It's a lot like making soup...

If there is a lack of salt, the potatoes and carrots will have less taste.
Leave out the garlic and the broth changes. Remember the story of "Stone Soup?" Many additions make something that encourages and nourishes all of us. Think of yourself as your favorite spice and dig in!

SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS FROM SEPTEMBER 17, 2024

- The Capital Campaign, Architectural Review (ART), & Vision Teams—Mitch Orndorff, Greg Eisenhauer, Nick Sardelis, Travis Morgan, Dave Schwantes, and Bill Thomasson presented the progress toward the building expansion. They presented two recommendations which were passed by unanimous votes:
 - On behalf of the Stewardship & Finance Team, Session approved (i) the draft contract with Church Campaign Services (CCS) for fund raising consulting services, with aggregate fees of \$27,600, be approved; (ii) the funding for the agreement will be from the Building Expansion investment fund at Wells Fargo (current balance = \$39k); and (iii) Travis Morgan, as President of Opequon Presbyterian Church of Winchester, Inc., shall be authorized to sign the CCS contract.
 - On behalf of the Stewardship & Finance Team, Session approved that (i) Balzer & Associates, Inc. be selected as the church's architect for the building expansion project; (ii) Greg Eisenhauer, as co-chair of the Architecture Review Team (ART), is authorized, in coordination with the Stewardship & Finance Team, to negotiate a definitive agreement with Balzer; (iii) the funding for the architectural fees will be determined by the Stewardship & Finance Team and (iv) Travis Morgan, as President of Opequon Presbyterian church of Winchester, Inc., shall be authorized to sign the contract. The estimated fees for Balzer are in the range of \$290k to approximately \$318k depending on the selection of certain optional services. If the amount exceeds \$318k. Session will be consulted for approval.

Mission Ministry

 The Mission Team approved using \$5,000 of the Lupton Fund for Move-in Ministry, part of the Family Promise Northern Shenandoah Valley, Inc. Carol Schempp, Karen Winters, and Pastor Julia will be the liaisons and help coordinate this effort.

- There is an opportunity for an individual to travel to Ethiopia (costs are already covered) to attend the BETHEL Synods 50th anniversary celebration in early November.
- Evangelism Ministry—Ben Brooks shared that the Evangelism Team is moving forward with the ordering and printing of Opequon Presbyterian Church T-Shirts
- Fellowship Ministry—Marj Pram highlighted the following events:
 - October 13, 2024 Blessing of the Pets at the Pitcock Shelter (2:00 PM—4:00 PM)
 - October 27, 2024 Chili Cook Off after the 11 AM Service (we need cooks and judges!)
- <u>Buildings & Grounds Ministry</u>—Mike Wygant and Jack Marquis presented the following motions and project statuses:
 - Session approved spending \$600 to connect the sewage pump to the security system.
 - Session approved paying \$8432 to install railings on either side of the porch entrance ramp.
 - There is a group discussing lighting improvements in the Memorial Sanctuary.
 - The second pew alteration needed to accommodate the audio-visual operation area is complete.
- Stewardship & Finance Ministry
 - Ken Smiy, OPC Financial Administrator, reminded Session that ministry area budgets for 2025 are due October 25.
 - Session approved the August 2024 Financial Report.
- Technology Ministry—The church is switching to a newly installed Wi-Fi and wired network on Friday, September 20, 2024.
- Christian Education Ministry—LOGOS begins September 18, 2024!
- Commissioned Communion Visitors—On September 22, 2024, the following individuals will be commissioned as At-Home Communion Servers:



Susan Homan


Director of Music



GENEROSITY MOMENT

(From Pastor Tracie Martin & the Generosity Team)

Where did the term "stewardship" come from?

Etymology: Stewardship was originally made up of the tasks of a domestic steward, from *stiġ* (house, hall) and *weard*, (ward, guard, guardian, keeper). In the beginning, it referred to the household servant's duties for bringing food and drink to the castle's dining hall.

Sometimes I wish we had better words to use when we talk about giving to and for the church. Time, Talent, Treasure... these terms are used, and sometime overused, but what should we use in their place?

Time: the giving of a part of one's day, week, month, year, using a part of one's life for the good of the larger community; thinking about and supporting something or someone outside oneself

Talent: the use of one's personal gifts for the betterment of the larger community; a recognition that one's abilities are the gift of God furthered by hard work ad thought; a means of thanking God for these gifts

Treasure: things of economic value such as money, bequests, stocks and bonds, the gems forged into our church bell

So, what words come to mind as substitutes? I have tried a Thesaurus, moving from English to a few other languages—nothing I can find so far works better or even as well as these three terms... sigh. The term "generosity" is used as a substitute for "stewardship," but even this falls a bit short of describing accurately how we support our congregation and our church.

There are many reasons why people give to the church, including:

- ► Worship—Giving is a way to respond to God's generosity and grace, and to acknowledge that everything we have comes from God. Generosity is an expression of love. God is the ultimate picture of generosity. Giving is a powerful response to love for God.
- ► Commitment—Giving to the church shows support for the Christian faith and what the church stands for. When people experience generosity, they are more likely to treat others generously themselves. While we might invest our finances into the stock market, real estate, or other assets to see growth, an investment in sharing God's love is the only one that has eternal significance.
- ► Thankfulness—Giving back to God is a way to say "thank you" for the blessings we receive. Giving can also create a relational connection between the giver and the receiver, and it can help people trust in God's generosity. Authentic generosity comes out of a place of gratitude. Helping your church community acknowledge how they are blessed by God can be a great start to authentic gratitude.

Generosity is not just for the wealthy. The amazing thing about Christianity is that it levels the playing field for how we are called to live and give. It's easy to believe that true rest, comfort, and success come with having possessions and money—especially if you're facing financial stress. With that in mind, it can feel extremely difficult to give. Still, Jesus is the source of true comfort. We are all stewards who can make a difference in God's world. Small gifts can move mountains, and they do.

Why give back to God? Because God gives to us.

If we believe what we say we believe, God is the source of everything. God provides the very air we breathe, the land we walk, the water we drink, food, companionship; everything that makes life and makes life good. Given this belief, how can we hold back when Christ asks his heart, hands and feet to take part in reaching out in mission, education, evangelism, support, and faithful worship? Your gifts to Opequon Church leave your fingerprints all over God's world today as well as preparing us all for an exciting future.
