

Dear Friends,

While Lent just began, by the end of this month, we will journey through Holy Week, from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday, with Maundy Thursday and Good Friday in-between. We recently moved from the fun and fellowship of a Pancake Party on Shrove Tuesday to the reflections of Ash Wednesday with ashes on the forehead giving perspective on life and death, mortality, and humility. We will experience similar highs, lows, and in-betweens during Lent and Holy Week upcoming (March 24-31).

As you know, our Lenten theme this year is "Wandering Heart," focusing on the disciple Peter through his encounters with Jesus. As the authors of our Sanctified Art worship series observe, "Like many of us, Peter has a wandering heart. His journey is not polished, or linear, or perfect, but he is always tethered to the love of God. When you look closely at Peter's story, you find Jesus at each step along the way-offering him abundance, catching him when he begins to sink, challenging him when he stands in the way, washing his feet, predicting his betrayal, and offering him agape love. This Lent, we're joining Peter in figuring out faith. We're not idolizing or vilifying him; instead, we're hoping to wander alongside him, open to what we might learn about Jesus (and ourselves) by stepping in his shoes."

I pray that Lent and Holy Week will open the eyes of our hearts, will renew, reshape, and revive us as followers of Christ, especially as we close out the month of March on Easter Sunday, proclaiming, "He is alive. He is alive. He IS alive!"

My colleague, Pastor Michael Lindvall, once emphasized in a sermon I heard, "I preached defiance, for Easter is just that... resurrection, I preached, is the forever mocking of the last enemy... I can't prove a thing, of course. I can only trust God to be God. And if God be God, this One who pulled five billion galaxies out of compacted matter, hurled planets into their places, and then imagined the lady slipper, can certainly

defy death in the twinkling of an eye. That is where you see such death-defying defiance – in the eyes."

Lord, open the eyes of our hearts in this season of reflection and remembrance, as well as new life.

### PASTOR JULIA'S MUSINGS

Friends in Christ,

At our Leadership Retreat this past month, the Elders, Deacons, and Staff of Opequon joined with Nancy Meehan-Yao, Shenandoah Presbytery's Associate General Presbyter. We had great conversations filled with thoughtfulness, laughter, and fellowship.

Nancy brought in a subject called "liminal space." Liminal space is the in-between time. It's like standing on your covered porch; you're not fully inside nor fully out. We were talking about how OPC is in the in-between, as are many of us. We are planning forward, looking forward to continued growth, and what's coming next but we aren't quite there yet. It's also like this time of year; we are in this weird middle ground between winter and spring, when tulips are starting to come out of the ground, but there are still some snowy days.

WOW—what an amazing topic as we come towards Lent. Lent is also liminal, it's the season that we walk with Jesus to the cross, but we aren't quite there yet. We aren't yet in Jerusalem. We aren't yet at the cross. We aren't yet at the resurrection. It's a bit unnerving, a bit uncomfortable, just like any in-between really is. We are filled with anticipation, but we have to be patient. We have to sit in the liminal, the journey because that's what this sacred time is for. This time of the Christian year is ALL about the journey. So what is your Lenten journey going to look like this year? Where do you want to sit with God in this journeying time?

I know for me, that I am determined to actually keep up a devotional. I'm the kind of person who has great hopes to read a devotional every day, but get distracted and then drop off, before furiously picking it back up and catching up (most of the time) right before the season ends. I'm hopeful, because I just bought a beautiful new devotional by one of my favorite authors, Kate Bowler, that I can keep that up as well as the OPC devotional that Carole put together!

The other practice I want to deepen this Lent is truly about journeying. I want to increase quiet walking time. I walk the dog all the time, but am often times distracted by my phone. This season, I want to leave the phone off and use walks as a time of reflection and prayer.

What do you want to add or let go of during your journey with Jesus this Lent? Let us be in this journey together, walking with each other as we go to the cross as a congregation and Church, knowing there will be 'alleluias' on the other side.

Julia is the patron saint
of Corsica. The closest
thing to sainthood under
the name of Tracie is a
footnote saying that most
"Tracies" are Christian.


As a child I loved Lent... at the beginning. Everyone in the family gave up something, generally a favorite food. Keeping that fast guaranteed our holiness and repentance. Of course, Sundays do not belong to Lent so we had a reprieve once a week, which helped.

Lent has become a bit more complex over the years, but it has also become more essential to my soul. The easy tradition of avoiding chocolate during the week has been replaced with a resolve to learn or do something that will make a

difference in my or someone else's life. Sundays are no longer a day off from the fast-of-the-year.

One year, I decided to change my language. Remember, I was a florist. Florists I knew had rather a coarse use of English. It was necessary to use the required adjectives if one was to be taken seriously at the wholesale house I used. Language has always been my strength. I needed to make a serious change if I was to be accepted at seminary. That was a tough 40 days... let me tell you. I still have stress dreams where I slip.

Not all fasts work. The intention to walk for at least an hour a day wound up leaving me three days in which to catch up for many, many days without exercise. The decision not to lose my temper with a particularly difficult person in my life finished with me firing her days



before Easter. We won't even consider talking about the many Lenten diets I tried. Disaster and remorse!

When you think about it, it's a good thing God is God. Who else could put up with the annual slips and misinterpretations? I understand Lent to be a time of preparation. Easter is a big deal! Jesus did not hover in front of the cross as is depicted in many period paintings. Those nails went through his wrists. The pain he suffered was real... humanly real. If we are to take Good Friday and Easter seriously, we need to get real about what happened... and we need to be prepared! Jesus did not give up chocolate... he gave up his life in a horrid way. He did not relax on Sunday and take a break from the situation... he rose from the dead! The concept is overwhelming! We should be overwhelmed.

Religion has a lot of details, practices, and rules. Many of our details, practices, and rules differ from denomination to denomination, but one thing is universal for Christians. That one thing is Easter. We can argue about how it happened, where it happened, and who experienced what, but there is no denying that the Easter event is still affecting humanity 2,000 years later. As my good friend Dora used to say, "All the rest is window dressing."

### SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS FROM FEBRUARY 20, 2023

- Session welcomed new Ruling Elders Rebecca Agbayani, Ben Brooks, and Jack Marquis to their first official Session meeting, joining reelected Elder Marj Praml who begins her second term.
- Stewardship and Finance reported that giving in January 2024 was strong. Session approved the January Financial report and recommended transfer of \$60k of excess cash from operating checking account to the Reserve Fund. The internal Annual Financial Review was completed in January.
- Leaders from the Stewardship and Finance,
  Buildings and Grounds and Vision Teams,
  developed a 3-year budgetary tool to help
  prospectively track priorities, costs and timelines
  to assist Session with funding decisions for
  larger projects outside the annual budget.
- Technology and Communications—Rebekah Witt is facilitating the team. Plans for the 2024 phone/WIFI system upgrade are in progress. Reconfiguration of the Live-Stream Desk Area in accordance with accessibility and emergency exit regulations is under discussion.
- Personnel and Administration welcomed Brenda Steffens to the team. Look for future newsletter articles highlighting our wonderful staff (Staff of the Month).
- Christian Education Ministry Team is busy planning VBS set for June 9-12, 2024. Session approved the 2024 VBS Leadership Team (Carole Witt, Rebekah Witt, Carrie Rockwell, Winter Brooks, Linda Shimer, and Layne Link) and VBS theme, "Something Old, Something New, Something Changed" that focuses on the story of Abraham and Sarah using a curriculum planned/written by the Christian Education Team.
- Deacons/Congregational Care Ministry—The 2024 Deacon Retreat will be held at Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Delaplane on March 2 (9:15 AM—2:00 PM).
- Visioning Ministry—The Pedestrian Path project proposal application (written by Alan McKay) was submitted to the Rappahannock Electric Coop's Power of Change Program to secure a grant to fund this project.
- Mission Ministry—Opequon's Medical Missionary Team, led by Max and Rebecca Agbayani, is busy packing donated medical supplies and non-medical donations for their Dominican Republic Medical Missionary Trip,

- March 2-16, 2024, following the team's commissioning on Sunday February 25, 2024.
- Are you looking for a way to get involved at OPC? Evangelism Ministry Team continues to seek volunteers to serve as Hospitality Greeters. Fellowship Ministry Team welcomes new volunteers to assist with many exciting fellowship events planned in 2024.
- Session approved a contract with Shallow Creek Electrical Services for \$3,800 to complete an electrical inspection and safety assessment of all wiring/panels as recommended by Buildings and Grounds.
- Session approved 2024 vacation days for Pastor David (September 14-17) and Pastor Julia (May 3-5; June 14-20, and July 22-24) as requested.
- The Annual 2023 Statistical Report approved by Session was filed with the PCUSA by Clerk of Session Ann Smith; a copy is included in Opequon's Annual Report.
- Pastor Tracie expressed her sincere appreciation to Session for the kind letter of thanks received from Clerk Ann Smith on behalf of Session in recognition of her creativity and passionate leadership that resulted in the highly successful 2023/2024 Stewardship Generosity Campaign.
- Opequon's first 2024 New Member Class is scheduled for February 25 and March 3.
- Session endorsed Rich Schempp's Hiett Global Misson Fund Grant Application to be submitted to Presbytery in support of the adult mission service trip to Tulcea, Romania June 21-July 2, 2024, to work with NOROC.
- Elder Jack Marquis was elected by Session to serve as Commissioner to attend the Presbytery meeting held virtually on February 27 (9:30 AM—12:30 PM).
- Session approved a request from member Amy Tubbs to hold the Camp Paddy Run banquet at Opequon in August (date to be determined).
- Session voted to endorse the application process for the Roots and Shoots Rainwater Harvesting Proposal prepared by Alan McKay with anticipated Virginia state funding support.

## NURSE NOTES: Making Your Medications Work Better

### Here are some tips for helping your medication work more effectively...

- 1. **Take your medication as directed.** Be sure to follow all the instructions for taking your medicines. Don't skip or take more of the medicine as this may cause harmful effects. Tracking your medication in an online tool can help you keep track and set reminders to take your medication(s).
- 2. **Keep your medication organized.** It isn't unusual for heart patients to have several different medications, making keeping track difficult. Learn ways to manage your medication and keep track using easy tools or our. You also can use a pill dispenser that helps sort your medication or a weekly pill organizer.
- 3. **Take your medicine even if you don't have noticeable symptoms.** When you have the sniffles or a fever, you know you're probably sick. But many cardiovascular conditions don't have symptoms that you can identify without a medical test or blood pressure reading.
- 4. Continue taking medicine even if symptoms seem to have "gotten better." People may discontinue their medication once they have improved their cholesterol or blood pressure numbers. However, the medication may be what is making the cholesterol or blood pressure levels go down, and if they stop taking it, their numbers go back up.
- 5. Tell your health care professionals and pharmacists about all the medications you are taking. Drug interactions can change the way a medication works, making it more effective, less effective or worse, combine to create a dangerous mix. Maintain a list of all the medications you're taking, including drug names and dose. Many people won't mention a drug they take because it's not a heart medicine. The prescriber needs to know about all the other drugs you're taking.
- 6. Make sure your health care professionals and pharmacists know about other supplements or over-the-counter drugs you may be taking. Your health care professionals need to have the whole picture of what you're taking so they can create a plan for the most effective treatment and identify possible interactions. Inform your health care team of all the over-the-counter drugs and herbal and/or nutritional supplements you are taking, including the names and dose. If you have high blood pressure and are on prescription medication, consult your health care professional before taking any over-the-counter medications or supplements.
- 7. **Be aware of any food interactions.** Check whether your medication should be taken on a full stomach or an empty one. That could affect how well your body absorbs it. What you eat and drink may also make a big difference. Drinking alcohol, for example, could change how well your liver processes medications. Even eating healthy can sometimes create a dangerous interaction between your medication(s) and the food and/or beverages you consume. Learn more about food and medication interactions.
- 8. **Be aware of potential side effects.** Medication routinely comes with detailed information about possible side effects. Familiarize yourself with the major ones and stay vigilant when starting a new medication so you can quickly identify bad reactions. An upset stomach, dry mouth and drowsiness are common medication side effects, but many people don't realize they may be coming from a medication. Be sure your health care professional knows if you've had any bad reactions or allergies to medication.

Taking medication as directed is important, but it's not the only action needed. Lifestyle changes, such as following a heart-healthy diet, not smoking and getting physical activity, play a key role in getting your health back on track.
