STAR WORDS ARE COMING IN JANUARY... BUT WHAT ARE "STAR WORDS?"

The use of star words, also called "star gifts," is a prayer practice connected to Epiphany and the new year. This will be the eighth year we have distributed "star words" at Opequon Church, prayerfully handed out as "God's word to you and for you." These intentional words, we pray, will guide you throughout the upcoming year. Typically, participants are encouraged to trust the word they have drawn, and not to replace the word. However, there is not a strong need to be the "star police" if an individual wants to trade. We encourage you to place your star word somewhere you will see it regularly throughout the year to allow consistent reflection on how God has moved through, around, or in connection to that word. We will hand out the star words on Sunday, January 4, at morning worship services, and then star words will be available for all! For those who can't be present on the 4th, we are seizing any opportunity to bring God's word to you. We can mail you one upon request or you can pick up a "star word" in the coming weeks.

RENEWAL OF BAPTISM SUNDAY IS JANUARY 11!

Each January, on Baptism of the Lord Sunday, we participate as a congregation in a Renewal of Baptism service. The service culminates in the congregation coming forward and touching the waters within the baptismal bowl. On January 11, those worshiping in person will have their own opportunity that morning to consider the gift of water, the gift of baptism. For those who are livestreaming worship, we invite you to have water available to you at home as you participate in worship. A clear glass of water before you would be helpful.

NOTES FROM PASTOR DAVID

"Good News to Tell— A Warm Welcome to Extend!"

Dear Friends in Christ,

We have completed another Advent journey and have traveled with hope to celebration of Christmas. We have heard the message of God proclaimed, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord." We have joined the heavenly chorus of angels who praised God, singing, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" We hurried with the shepherds to find Mary and Joseph and the Child lying in the manger. And, with the wise men, we knelt and paid him homage. It has been a good season of remembrance, reflection, and rejoicing. We have been invited into the Christmas story as a guest and discovered the wondrous Gift in the manger. And, in this "good news of great joy for all people," in this "to you is born Gift," we have been welcomed by God.

Now, the challenge is before us to respond! We have good news to tell the world and a warm welcome to extend to family, friends, neighbors, and even strangers as we invite them to share in the blessings of Christian community. Maybe we have taken for granted the gift of Christ's Church. Maybe we have forgotten that people need the Church. Maybe we have ignored an opportunity to talk with someone else about the importance of church within our lives. Maybe we have neglected to ask someone to join us in church. Years ago, I read a book entitled, *Welcome*, by an Episcopal layman, named Andy Weeks, who led over 250 conferences about outreach and welcome. Andy later came to Opequon Church to lead an evangelism workshop for our presbytery. I find the following excerpt to be both a timely challenge and a spiritual calling:

"A significant proportion of those in our communities have no religious affiliation. Although they may be materially comfortable, their spiritual poverty is genuine, even though it may not be very apparent. Many do not have the support, comfort, and care of a community. In times of joy or distress, they may have no faith. Often, they are so frantic with work and activities that they have no time to address the spiritual and ethical needs of their families. When something surprising happens, some say: 'Oh my God,' but it has no meaning. To me, that is a tragically empty and lonely way to try and cope

with life. We know the greatest story ever told, but if we do not tell it, it is dead. And, if we do not tell it now, who will? Are we willing to abdicate this responsibility to cults and sects, or are we going to accept the challenge?"

Our journey to Bethlehem teaches us that we have good news to tell and a warm welcome to extend because God has welcomed us! So, let's get going in meeting this challenge in this New Year of 2026!! I have a sense that if we do, it will be a Happy New Year in more ways than one, especially for ourselves and those we bless.

PASTOR TRACIE'S JUST THINKIN'...

January always feels like a loooooong month to me. The holidays are over. Most of us are deeply tired. The weather is cold and windy. Christmas bills abound. Roads are tricky. Days are short. Still, I rather like January for its sense of hope and new opportunities.



Around the middle of November, things start to move rapidly. Turkey goes on sale; Christmas music begins to pop up. The holiday rush can become overwhelming. Life just becomes too much... way too much, but we need to stay the course through to the new year.

Now, in January, all the predictions have been predicted. Returns and holiday exchanges have all been made. Leftovers are completely gone. There are no more cookies stashed in zip-tops at the bottom of the freezer. It's time to just stop and pay attention. It's time to start over.

Down here, January offers the occasional weather day home. Ice, snowstorm, high wind, whatever it takes, these days are precious times for just stopping. They are better than school snow days. As an adult, I save tasks that cannot be fit in during the holidays for January weather days. I wash indoor windows, read books and articles I stashed in the bedroom, and organize closets. Often, I reclaim quiet time ignored at the end of the year for thinking..., praying..., just being.

Then, at the end of January or by the end of the first week of February at the latest, the forsythia buds show just a bit of yellow. Those first buds take a week or more to bloom inside, but they show growth within a day. I cut just a few branches every day or so to watch them bloom. This is hope. This is a promise of spring. This is the year's true beginning.

PS—You can force almost any woody bloom indoors by cutting the branch, pounding it with a hammer at the end, and putting it in lukewarm water. It should begin to show growth within a few days. Full bloom may take a week. The blossoms will be smaller and less colorful or fragrant than those allowed to develop outside, but they will bloom. Sometimes I add just a dash of Sprite to the water to feed the blossoms. Sometimes the branches even develop roots and can be planted outside in warmer weather.

- ✂ Buildings & Grounds: Thanks to Bud Proctor for the recent donation of an upright freezer.
- ✂ Stewardship & Finance Ministry: Session approved the December Financial Report, the 2026 Giving Events Calendar, and list of 2026 Offering Counters. Session reviewed the proposed 2026 budget (projected income/pledges and expenses). Approval of a budget was deferred to the January 2026 Session meeting in hopes that additional pledges will be received to balance the budget.
- ✂ Responding to Shenandoah Presbytery's per capita pledge request, Session approved the 2026 budgeted pledge (\$37,944), which was filed online by the Clerk of Session.

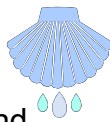

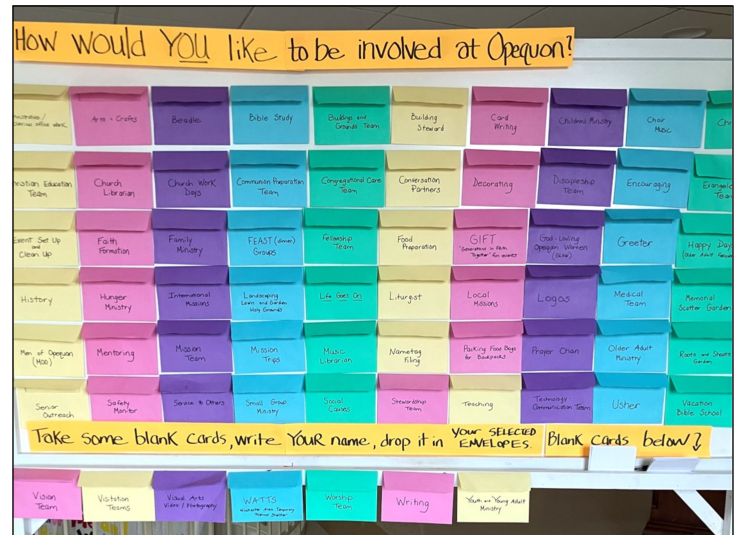

Dear Curious,

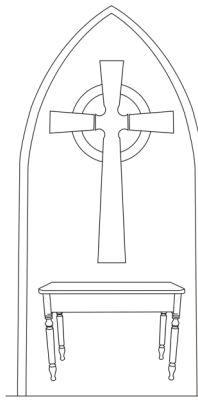

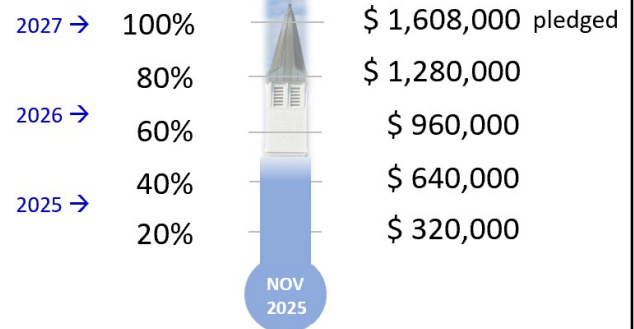
MAKING A PLACE AT THE TABLE: Prayers for Our Capital Campaign

RESOURCING

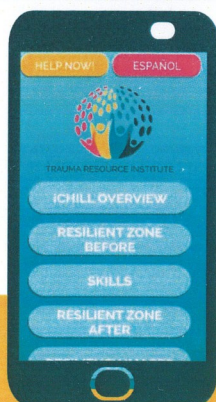
A Resource is any person, place, thing, or memory (real or imagined) that provides you comfort, joy, peace, or happiness.

- You can ground by sitting in a chair, standing against a wall, laying down, walking, or floating in water.
